

About This Guide:

This guide is provided to assist our visitors in identifying the birds most commonly seen at Point Lobos State Natural Reserve. Most can be seen throughout the year, but a few only seasonally. The habitat sections show where they are most commonly, but not exclusively, seen. Many more species than those shown reside in or visit Point Lobos.

The birds at Point Lobos range from one of the smallest (Anna's Hummingbird, 4 in. long) to one of the largest (California Condor, 9 ft. wingspan) in North America. The sizes are roughly representative of the differences between them, but are not to scale.

Bird plumage patterns can differ, depending on age, sex, season and many other variables. This guide uses images of birds which are generally representative of those seen in the Reserve.

Point Lobos is a good place to observe the nesting of some of our showier birds, including the Great Blue Herons at Coal Chute Point, Black-crowned Night-Herons in the Bird Island area, Brandt's Cormorants on the near-shore rocks, and Pelagic Cormorants on the cliff faces near Sea Lion Point. The nests of other birds are not easily seen.

If you have any **questions**, please feel free to ask a docent, who may know the answer or direct you to other resources. Your digital photograph will help with identification.




